#### Paddlefest by The Editor

Arriving at Paddlefest, the omens weren't good. From Landrake onwards we could see a line of sea mist over the coast and it looked like our first evening was going to be cold and damp. Fortunately, Mount Edgcumbe isn't technically on the coast so we arrived in glorious sunshine.

The camping was very civilised. The event is limited to 200 people camping (of whom about 15 were from the PPCA and a similar number form the St. Austell club) and the field was huge. Terry attempted to set up a tented village but was soon surrounded so we ended up in a couple of groups. The field had some delightful chemical toilets and some luxury showers - at least, that's what it said on the outside.

The paddlers were an interesting mixture. The event was advertised as being for any type of craft but the paddlers were almost entirely in sea boats or on SUPs. There were a few sit on tops and even a couple of open boats but they were definitely in the minority.

The organiser gave a useful introduction to the massed ranks of assembled paddlers and we were all ready to go.

The first evening was spent setting up camp, eating, drinking at the reasonably priced bar and admiring the evening light.

The next morning was an early start thanks to a dawn chorus of seagulls but the morning light made it worthwhile.

There were a number of paddles available on the Saturday, ranging from 3 to 8 miles, the idea being that you could do one in the morning and one in the afternoon. The paddles, other than the SUP expedition, were advertised as being suitable for all craft. I shall return to this later. There were also have-a-go sessions on SUPs, open boats and kayaks although the booking for this was something of a mystery to everyone. Each paddle had a leader and a second in command, some known to us (Terry and Gavin) and some not.

Tracy and I decided to go to Penlee Point as the weather was particularly calm. All went well until the briefing session, when we were asked what boat we were paddling. "An open boat" we replied. "Oh" was the answer. Apparently the paddle was intended for sea boats, although it didn't say that anywhere, and the leader was concerned that there would be speed issues with an open boat mixing with sea kayaks resulting in the group getting split up. Fortunately these proved to be unfounded and most of the sea boats managed to keep up with us. The weather stayed calm so we stuck our noses around the Point and rock-hopped back, bumping into the Saturday Paddle on the way back. They returned the favour by dropping in on Paddlefest. A confession - I never did pass on Becky's hello to Gavin. Sorry.

In the afternoon, we were treated to an historical tour of Millbay, the Hoe and Drake's Island by Terry who demonstrated a knowledge of local tidal conditions that was beyond some of our visitors. Terry's second in command was a sea boat instructor from Buckinghamshire who was clearly used to travelling.

The evening was spent in much the same fashion as the first, the reasonably priced bar doing very well. Later on Tracy and I sneaked off with a bat detector to see what was going on in the park at night.

The forecast for the Sunday was pretty poor so most of the tents came down first thing. The aim of the Sunday was to hold various workshops - rolling, forward paddling, and other complicated things in sea boats. As there was nothing for open boats, we watched from the shelter of a convenient tree with coffee and cake as the rain came down.

So what did we make of it? 200 paddlers is a pretty good number - not too many, not too few. There were a few trade exhibitors there but no rampant commercialism. It's a shame there wasn't more of a spread of types of craft. The event was advertised as being for all craft but the paddles were dominated by sea boats, some of whom learned a few things about what an open boat can do.

A special mention has to go to Marty and Martin who missed out on the paddles as they were doing the have-a-go open boat sessions only to have the Saturday afternoon session cancelled due to wind after the trips had left.

If you didn't go this year, I would recommend it for next year. It's a chance to meet like-minded people from strange and exotic parts of Cornwall and I think everyone who went learned something. It relies on support from local clubs like the PPCA and St Austell both for coaching and paddling so please put the date in your diary for next year.
