There will be no "Any Other Business" at the end of the meeting.


This is the club's biggest meeting of the year and it's a chance for members to have their say. It's particularly important this year with Project Neptune being on the agenda so please come along if you possibly can. It's a tighter agenda than usual so the committee would like to make a prompt start.

Pool Sessions by Andy Nicholls

The swimming pool sessions are happening again over this winter. You can use these to learn and practice any of those wet skills you have been struggling with in the comfort of clear water with someone stood beside you to assist and advise. Club boats are available but you need to organise transport of the boats (which also need a thorough rinse) to and from the pool. They can be collected by arrangement with the equipment officer at Saturday paddles and other times. Some coaches might be able to bring boats but don't just expect it.

The pool sessions are available to book now. £11 for a GP kayak up to 3m long; over that length it's £22 due to space limitations.

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The River Season 2016/17 (White Water Paddling) by Andy Nicholls, Club Leader (based on an original by Clive)

The River Season crept up on us this year so fast it beat the newsletter! The river season kicks off from October and runs until the middle of March meaning that we will be paddling through the winter, so think cold and dress warm. River Paddling is great for those thrill seekers who want to raise their adrenaline levels! If you are new to river paddling it's a steep learning curve and the environment can be unforgiving. I suggest you get along to the beginner sessions early on in the season. A few swims are inevitable for the white water novice paddler (and the experienced) and the water temperature in Plymouth Sound is like a bath compared to our rivers, especially as the winter sets in. As well as warm clothing the equipment required for river paddling is a boat, paddle, buoyancy aid, helmet and spray deck. (Spray deck is not required for open boat trips). Failure to have all the relevant equipment will result in you not being able to paddle.

Our River trips are divided into 3 categories:

- 1) Beginners. These trips are aimed at the kayak paddler who is either a white water novice or is not yet ready to step up to our intermediate trips. Intermediate kayak paddlers are welcome on these trips on the understanding that they give our beginners plenty of time, room and encouragement to develop their river / entertaining skills.
- 2) Intermediate. These trips are for the kayak paddler who now finds our beginners sessions easy.
- 3) Open boat. These trips are for our open boat enthusiasts. There may (or may not) be opportunities for open boats to join the kayaks trips and vice versa, but please seek the coaches permission first, don't just turn up expecting to paddle.

Club equipment on white water

Club kayaks with accompanying equipment, to be used only on Club river trips, will be available for long term loan again this year, at a charge of £30. If you wish to take us up on this please contact Pete Anderson who can arrange to meet you and sign the kit over to you.

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Project Neptune

The project have done some initial calculations of the likely use of the facility and slipway based on details from the PPCA, Marjons, schools and the Navy rowing clubs. These estimate a usage of

- Tuesday evening 55 users
- · Saturday morning 42 users

They expect this to rise over a 4-year period to

- Tuesday evening 82 users
- Saturday morning 62 users

These figures are based on the clubs who have currently expressed an interest. With the inclusion of an indoor community space, this will increase further and if any other clubs come on board it will rise still further. The figures do not include regattas (100+ participants approximately 3 times p.a.) and open days (50-100 participants, 7 times p.a. Apr-Oct).

Implications of the project with respect to it being in the blast zone of the oil depot are being considered by the Health and Safety Executive who have requested details on the number of people using the facility.

The council have now taken an interest in the project and are considering alternative sites including the Stonehouse Barracks site when this is released.

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Sea Fever by David Pedlow

For me, it was a childhood fantasy come to life.

Over to the right the darker smudge glimpsed from the wave crests was Penlee; back at my 7 o'clock the white reflective paint (or is it guano?) on the cap of the breakwater lighthouse was coming and going as the sea dictated; and over to the left 100 metres or so away, appearing and disappearing as the swell crests came and went, was a warship heading slowly in to temporary anchorage in Cawsand Bay; her lines softened and blurred by the mid-day overcast and the increasing rain.

O.K., so the childhood fantasy turned my sick bed into a giant hovercraft tug, and involved a broken down liner in the middle of an Atlantic gale; but the reality of the swells, and the relative sizes of H87 and the Peapod surpassed anything my childhood imagination could encompass. Suddenly I was living in that long forgotten dream.





Never before had I been able to properly grasp just how insignificant and how invisible our kayaks could be. At the bottom of the swell there was nothing. Nothing, except the sliding, shifting, slopes of water. Reference points on land, my companion paddlers, even the large and very solid warship close by, were completely blotted out. And then the gradient changed. My kayak was carried upwards, and for a moment or two there, just where I wanted it to be, thank goodness, was the most important thing in my present universe, the bulk of HMS Echo.

As we slowly paddled past her, then swung across her stern, it wasn't a moment but a protracted period of time that rewarded us for the efforts we had made. The sneaky breaking waves that ran along the top of the swells, drawing out our bracing and balance skills, bringing our hearts into our mouths, were just a part of the reward.

And then there was the joy of the downwind, down swell run to the Breakwater; followed by encountering, and avoiding, a fleet of fellow thrill seekers in dinghies, feet dangling over the elevated weather gunwales as they beat up past us — all of us hemmed in by a camaraderie forming torrential wall of rain, that had Jane leading us home on a compass bearing.

Finally the slow relaxation, as the rain eased; the visibility improved; we avoided collision with the dinghy unexpectedly tearing crosswind with a jammed spinnaker, straight at us; and the dirty water at the end of Mountbatten Breakwater, the sting in the tail of so many paddles, was successfully navigated.




Heartfelt thanks are due to EMU, Jane Seigne and Gavin for helping me live out this childhood fantasy. I can only hope they got as much from it as I did.

The Linton Lock scheme

Keen canoeists are often at odds with Hydro developers even though they both benefit greatly from the natural world and healthy rural waterways. Some developers of renewable energy see white water as only a resource to be harnessed. Conversely, world class paddlers revel in the power that water releases.

The planned Linton Lock hydro brings these two worlds together by including a white water course alongside the development. Scheduled for completion in the first part of 2017, the scheme will alos generate 1.87 GWh of electricity: enough to power 450 homes. Linton Hydro Ltd chose to work with Triodos Bank's corporate Finance Team who helped them raise £2.5 million for the construction of the project. It will generate clean renewable electricity as well as new modern fish pass and a canoe pass in partnership with Canoe England. www.lintonhydro.co.uk
