
Editorial

Kayaking in Antarctica



It was with mounting excitement that we left the tender lobby of the ship, into the zodiac whilst our kayaks were manoeuvred into the waters of Neko Harbour which is on the Antarctic peninsula. We then cautiously eased ourselves from the zodiac to the kayak and there we were, kayaking in Antarctica! Snow was gently falling, and we made our way in single file through the sea ice. Initial problems of having to share a double kayak were soon overcome and harmony resumed.

It was eerily quiet - and then we heard the rumble from the live glacier. Gentoo penguins gracefully swam effortlessly by. It was magical.

But Antarctica had more to offer. First was the sound of a whale breathing / sleeping, and then the sound of a whale blowing and witnessing the massive spray. Then a sighting of a fin and the huge body. And then more. We watched 3 humpbacked whales gently glide to and fro as they happily fed on the plentiful krill in the waters, 20 – 50 metres away. No records broken, no dramas – 5km in 2 hours and brilliant.



It was a fantastic experience, and now all I have to do when paddling in The Sound is close my eyes and the rocks become icebergs, the penguins become cormorants and a glimpse of a seal...well, let's just wait and see what happens.

PPCA Summer Season 2025

As I write I must confess that with nighttime temperatures down to minus 3 it doesn't feel like summer in the morning, but with beautiful sunny days, it does by the afternoon! Meteorological spring has sprung, and the large spring tides tell me that astronomical spring is not far away. With British Summer Time commencing at the end of the month we will have lighter evenings and the club summer calendar will commence. How exciting is that?



All of the sessions that are currently planned can be found on the club google calendar HERE. If you use Google calendar it is also possible to import the PPCA Calendar so that all entries are automatically updated.

Recreational paddles will continue on Saturdays as per the winter calendar, but with fewer cancellations due to storms, hopefully. The standard trip from Mountbatten is on the water (OTW) at 10:00 and returning mid-afternoon. On the first Saturday of each month there is a longer trip suitable only for sea kayaks. On those days we also offer a shorter trip (OTW at 10:30) for newbies, time pressured (i.e. needing the whole afternoon free), injured and/or lazy. They are generally back on terra firma by lunchtime.

Because it stops raining in BST, the white water season draws to a close and the last club trip will be on 30 h March. As some may observe it hasn't rained consistently for much of the winter either so climate change is certainly affecting our sport. Many thanks go to our White Water leaders who are few in number but high in quality and who have worked hard this winter. Round of applause please for Clive, Jane, Pete, and Phil. We hope to have more leaders by next winter to spread the responsibility wider.

With the light evenings we are also able to offer both training opportunities and short recreational paddles on the Tuesday club night each week. As with the Saturdays these are all rostered on the calendar and as with all of the Tuesday evening activity is OTW at 18:00. Training is available depending a little on what is in demand. This year we plan to start with just some refresher evenings, an opportunity to revisit any paddle skills up to the Paddle UK (PUK) Sea Kayak Award level. These can be learner led – i.e. what do YOU need to practice?

After that, Clive and Andy are running a coaching course to get new and relatively new paddlers up to the old British Canoeing (BC) 2

star award level, which is roughly equivalent to the PUK Explore Award. To this end they will be using the PPCA Kayak Explore Skills Passport.



You can be issued with this at any stage and the coaches can sign off parts of the syllabus as paddlers gain new or polish up on existing skills.



In July Nigel is running a course on tides, weather, buoyage and the like, all important

nautical knowledge for sea paddlers. In August Adam is offering an opportunity to brush up on your emergency skills with 4 evenings focusing on sea kayak safety and rescue. At the end of August Terry is running 2 evenings as an introduction to sea kayaking, ideal for newish paddlers who have mainly only paddled shorter general purpose boats.

You will notice on the calendar that there are some gaps in the Tuesday evening training calendar and, indeed, there is no reason why courses cannot be run simultaneously. This

allows the flexibility for other opportunities in response to demand and appropriate for conditions. For example, there is a possibility of getting the club open boats out, or even the SUPs.

Of course, to get a response to demand, the demand needs to be made. As club leader, please feel free to make your demands known to me, although you might



get a better response to polite requests instead! The point is that your club will endeavour to respond to YOUR training needs, whatever they may be. Do talk with any of the coaches or me.

Lastly, starting in early May we will run a Friday evening recreational paddle from Mountbatten, OTW at 18:00. This used to be primarily for open boats (Canadians, canoes or whatever else you would like to call them) but ALL craft are welcome. There is an easy pace and a relaxed atmosphere to enjoy being on the water with family and friends. As always the programme is also liable to change either due to leader illness, injury or absence and, of course, the prevailing conditions. Watch the Forum and Facebook for details prior to any event. Wishing all our members a fun packed summer,

We have recently received some correspondence from Paddle UK.

Subject: Rebranding Opportunity for Full Alignment with Paddle UK

Dear PPCA,

As you are likely aware, Phase 1 of our rebrand to Paddle UK has been an outstanding success. Moving forward, it is crucial that our affiliated clubs seize this opportunity to align with our brand vision in a cohesive and synergistic manner.

Our brand consultants have thoroughly reviewed your club's positioning and have recommended that a name change be considered in order to fully align with our brand strategy. We propose that, effective April 1st, 2025, your club adopts the name "Plymouth Paddlesport Community (PPC)". This change will ensure consistency with our overarching brand identity and help to strengthen our collective presence.

We understand that this will necessitate updates to your website and email addresses. Our brand consultants are available to provide support and guidance throughout this process. While they explored various options for retaining the PPCA abbreviation, they were unable to find a suitable alternative. However, we believe this is a small trade-off for the significant advantages of fully aligning with the Paddle UK brand.

Pete demonstrated his canoeing skills by paddling his canoe down the loop single handed. His first descent of the loop in his canoe".

 22nd February At last the cold winds have gone and with the thermometer touching 12 degrees a dozen of us were led by Andy, all in sea kayaks across to Drake's Island and Barn Pool before heading up into St John's lake to lunch at the dam in spring sunshine. Some went for a long walk over lunch to a locked toilet! Meantime others did some kingfisher spotting. There was some a nice ground swell to enjoy on the way back along the Hoe and across to MB.

• 23rd February Pete write: After double checking the arrival of the days heavy rain, it was decided to head to the Dart Loop with the motley crew of 7 that had assembled including a Loop debutant and a pub landlord. A pleasant run of a low level Loop ensued with pop outs at Triple One, splats at Lovers Leap, and lots of small wave surfing with the odd roll.
